PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Brothers and Sisters,

I hope that you and your loved ones enjoyed a pleasant and relaxing summer. The members and staff of the SMART Northeast Regional Council have been hard at work winning work hours,

expanding prevailing wage standards, and giving back to the communities where our members live and work. As you'll see in the pages ahead, it's been a terrific few months, and this fall will continue to be full of important work and progress.

The spring and summer were busy with celebratory moments and important milestones including our membership meeting, Retiree Lunch, and the retirement celebration for Rick Keogh. On the jobsite, our members played a key role in restoring a local landmark, securing the iconic copper rooster weather vane atop Somerville's City Hall clock tower as part of the building's \$3.85 million restoration.

We took a strong stand for Project Labor Agreements and prevailing wage standards for offsite fabrication. For years, companies have dodged fair wage standards by shifting construction work to nearby "offsite" locations. In Connecticut, our members played a key role in winning protections for custom fabrication, which supports local shops that hire in-state and pay fair wages. In Massachusetts, we pushed back forcefully against efforts to deny prevailing wages for work on fabricating systems for the Clarendon Hill public housing project. This effort was about more than a single project: it was about stopping a dangerous precedent that could open the door to wage theft, unsafe working conditions, and the erosion of standards we've worked generations to build.

Unfortunately, the news isn't as promising on the federal level. The Trump administration has authorized extensive funding cuts that put vital projects and union jobs at risk:

- \$327 million in federal funding was cut for the Allston Multimodal Project in Massachusetts which was set to deliver more than 3,000 union jobs. Now the project's future and thousands of work hours are in jeopardy.
- \$34 million in federal grant funding was cut for the Salem Terminal Project, which was set to be built under a PLA to support future offshore wind projects. The project would have supported more than 800 union construction jobs, but it's now on hold.
- Nearly \$32 million in federal funding that had been allocated to support transportation construction materials was also canceled, shelving more vital projects and work hours.

These cuts show that federal funding decisions have a direct impact on union jobs, and the projects that strengthen our region's economy and infrastructure.

That's why building strong relationships with local, state, and federal leaders is so important. By working together with our allies to support labor-friendly policymakers, we strengthen our ability to protect jobs, secure more work hours for our members, and shape regulations that benefit working people. Collective action in politics ensures we have a voice in decisions that affect our industry and our communities.

As always, thank you for your hard work and dedication. Our strength as a union comes from members like you, and together, we will continue to protect our standards, support our communities, and shape the future of our trade.

HISTORIC SOMERVILLE CLOCK TOWER RENOVATION


Somerville's iconic City Hall clock tower reached a major milestone in its restoration, thanks to the skill and dedication of Local 17 members. Members carefully transported the building's distinctive copper rooster weathervane to the site and expertly secured it atop the tower. Originally built in 1852, the structure had fallen into disrepair in recent years, making this work an important step in preserving a treasured landmark.

The renovation includes a new copper covering for the tower and roof. This project is part of a broader initiative by Somerville's Capital Projects Division to maintain and enhance municipal buildings, ensuring they remain functional, safe, and historically preserved for future generations. Suffolk Construction Company won the contract to complete the work.













A WIN FOR UNION JOBS AND HOUSING IN EVERETT

Thanks to strong union advocacy, the Everett City Council approved The Sofia project, an affordable housing development at 380 2nd Street. This union-built residential housing development is a major victory for our members and the community. It will create more than 1,300 good-paying union jobs, provide hundreds of new housing units for working families, prioritize local hiring and apprenticeships, and invest in Everett through public improvements and a new Good Neighbor Fund.

The legislative season has brought a major win for working people. On June 6, 2025, Senate Bill 1370 officially passed in Connecticut, extending prevailing wage protections to offsite custom fabrication.

This is a historic victory. The workers of Connecticut took action and played a huge part in making this happen through every action. Thank you for standing up and fighting for quality and a strong prevailing wage.

LOCAL 40 PENSION UPDATE

The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC) has officially approved \$9.87 million in Special Financial Assistance (SFA) for SMART Local 40's Pension Plan. This funding, made possible by former President Joe Biden's American Rescue Plan, helps protect and secure the retirement our members have worked a lifetime to earn.

This was a huge win for our union and a testament to what we can achieve when workers' voices have a seat at the table at the highest levels of government.

PLAN HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✓ The full \$9.87 million includes interest and is expected to be paid by the end of June.
- ✓ These funds will be used exclusively for pension benefits and administrative expenses as required by law.

For years, we've fought to protect the promises made to working Americans, to retire with dignity and respect. Thanks to the efforts of our union leadership, the strength of our members, and the bold action of President Biden, this victory marks a major step forward in protecting the retirement benefits our members have worked hard to earn.

REGIONAL MANAGER'S REPORT

As fall 2025 is upon us, so is the election cycle for local politicians. As I've said before, ELECTIONS HAVE CONSEQUENCES. The mayors and officials we elect are often the decision-makers on whether construction projects move forward in their cities and towns. Electing pro-labor and pro-worker candidates who advocate for safer workplaces and careers in the skilled trades with health insurance and retirement benefits helps to strengthen the communities in which we live and raise our families.

On a national level, there is still a lot of uncertainty regarding tariffs and how they will affect ongoing and future construction projects in the Northeast. We've already seen several jobs put on hold, and a few abandoned altogether.

On a state level, we are excited to announce that the PLA legislation we have fought for over the past several years has finally passed. In addition, Governor Maura Healey has signed an executive order allowing all state construction projects to be considered for a Project Labor Agreement (PLA).

60TH ANNUAL CLAMBAKE

Local 63 celebrated its 60th Annual Clambake on July 16 at the Ludlow Fish & Game Club. This year's event was one for the record books, with more than 230 members and guests joining together in solidarity.

A special thank-you goes out to the dozens of Local 63 volunteers whose dedication and hard work made this milestone event a success.

SMART IN THE COMMUNITY

BROCKTON FOOD BANK VOLUNTEERING

Our union was proud to partner with the Charity Guild to deliver food to homebound seniors in Brockton last April. The Guild operates two food pantries and a home food delivery program for seniors and those who are homebound.

In Plymouth County, about 30 percent of households reported experiencing food insecurity in 2024. A minor change of circumstances, like an unexpected medical bill, could force families to make an impossible choice between paying their bills and feeding their children. This event highlighted our union's commitment to serving the community and embodied the Guild's theme that "Food is love, and that to feel nourished is to feel cared for."

CONNECTICUT PREFAB BILL VICTORY

In June, we scored a major victory in the state of Connecticut in the fight to close the prevailing wage loophole, with the passage of Senate Bill 1370. The measure supports prevailing wage protections for offsite custom fabrication.

The workers of Connecticut showed up and played a huge part in this victory, banding together and fighting for equality and a strong prevailing wage. This win means fair pay for custom offsite fabrication, stronger labor standards, and more union work staying local, especially for trades like sheet metal workers, who are impacted by the expansion of these protections to offsite work. This is what being union strong looks like.

SOMERVILLE PLA RALLY

In June, history was made in Somerville and our union was proud to be a part of it. The city celebrated the signing of its first-ever Project Labor Agreement. This was a milestone victory for union labor, community power, and the future of family-sustaining union jobs.

The Union Square Neighborhood Council (USNC) and Rafi Properties announced a landmark Community Benefits Agreement (CBA) tied to the Somernova campus expansion in Union Square. As part of the project's Collective Bargaining Agreement, Rafi Properties has executed a Project Labor Agreement (PLA) with the Greater Boston Building Trades Unions, North Atlantic States Regional Council of Carpenters, and Shawmut Design & Construction for the expansion of Somernova's campus.

STEPHEN LYNCH RALLY

Local 17 members turned out in force in May for the "Fight for the Working Class Rally" with Rep. Stephen Lynch. Our members stood side by side for labor rights, pensions, privacy protections, and other issues crucial to workers and their families.

Demonstrators filled the Hancock Adams Common, carrying signs, chanting slogans, and loudly cheering on an array of speakers. Rep. Lynch said he'd never seen so many people fighting for so

many different causes in one place, calling it a direct response to President Donald Trump's first 100 days in office.

"We come together, not simply to voice our protest, but to actually respond to pushback to fight back against the Trump administration," Rep. Lynch told the cheering crowd.

LOCAL 17 HELPS ELECT LISA FIELD

State Representative Lisa Field knows firsthand the struggles working families face every day—whether that's dealing with substance use, the rising cost of living, or tragedies such as losing one's home.

That's why, in June's special election, SMART Local 17 members stood in solidarity with Field to help elect this longtime union advocate and Associate Director of the Massachusetts Nurses Association to public office. Our members powered phone banks, labor walks, and other get-out-the-vote efforts. Field secured the seat by just a handful of votes, with a recount now possible due to the razor-thin margin.

Field has spent years fighting for workers' rights, fair working conditions, and respect on the job. We are confident she will continue the legacy of the late Representative Carol Doherty in Taunton and Easton.
